Miller, originally named Missouri River Queen was built in 1985. Both are owned by Louisville Metro Government and offer public cruises along the Ohio River.
Brennan House and Medical Office Museum 631 S. Fifth St. 502-540-5145 www.thebrennanhouse.org	The 1868 Italianate residence is preserved as the Brennan family left it, housing their collection of mid-nineteenth century art and furnishings. The medical office includes surgical instruments of the period, an examining table, and a medical library.
Copper and Kings 1121 E. Washington St. 502-561-0267 www.copperandkings.com	Using traditional copper-pot distillation, the distillery located in Butchertown produces brandy and vapor-distilled absinthe. Tours and tasting opportunities are available.
The Cressman Center for Visual Arts 100 E. Main St. 502-852-0288 www.art.louisville.edu	The center is home to the University of Louisville’s Department of Fine Arts glass program. The facility features a hot shop and cold working studios, sculpture studios and shops, a seminar room, and galleries.

Thomas Edison House 729 E. Washington St. 502-585-5247 www.edisonhouse.org	Located in historic Butchertown, this 1850s cottage was once home to Thomas Edison. It is now a historic house and museum that seeks to preserve his memory and remarkable achievements.
Waterfront Park 129 E. River Rd. 502-574-3768 www.louisvillewaterfront.com	The 85-acre park includes the Great Lawn and Festival Plaza for special events, two children's play areas, two restaurants, picnic areas, walking paths, and views up and down the Ohio River. In 2013, the newest addition to the park was opened with the completion of the Big Four Bridge. A former railroad bridge converted into a pedestrian and bicycle path crossing the Ohio River connecting Louisville with Jeffersonville in Southern Indiana.
